MINUTES
PUBLIC HEARING OF THE BUDGET & OTHER BUSINESS
MARCH 30, 2010**

Mr. Woska opened the meeting with a salute to the flag, moment of silence and roll call.

Mr. Edwards announced: "The New Jersey Open Public Meetings Law was enacted to insure the right of the public to have advance notice of and to attend the meetings of public bodies at which any business affecting their interests is discussed or acted upon." In accordance with the provisions of this Act, the Brick Township Board of Education has caused notice of this meeting to be posted on the Administration Office bulletin board, the official District website and Channel BTV-20, and sent to the Asbury Park Press and Municipal Clerk's Office.

Mr. Pifko, Negotiations Committee, indicated that the Administration had approached the Unions to inquire about a willingness to freeze salaries and contribute to health care benefits. The BTANSAS (Unit) and Central Administrators have indicated their intent to accept a salary freeze and to contribute to health care. Negotiations continue with B.T.E.A. and T.W.U. and are confidential.

Public Hearing of the 2010-2011 School District Budget

Mr. Hrycenko began the budget presentation saying that this is the best of times and the worst of times. Some of the best are: the progress towards District goals, the Math Elementary Program, the response of the high school teachers and administration toward Block Scheduling, middle and elementary schools sharing ideas and techniques, the high schools' spring musicals, discussion with the seniors to plan next year, the solar panels and the B.E.S.T. Program. Some of the worst are: loss of \$2.8 million of surplus, loss of \$6.8 million of state aid, increase in salaries and health benefits. District priorities are: 1) maintaining the academic integrity, 2) providing students the opportunity to grow, 3) reaching District Goals, 4) fulfilling obligations to students and staff and 5) being responsible with taxpayer funds and 6) recognizing the tough economic realities. The budget is \$1 million less than last year. 2010-2011 will have fewer administrators, fewer teachers and fewer support staff, while striving to keep the class size to 25 in the elementary school and 25-30 in the middle school. The middle school sports programs are cut.

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Mr. Edwards continued, describing the zero-based budget process - starting with nothing and meeting with every program manager to examine enrollment, determine staffing and establish program supplies, questioning what is really necessary for a thorough and efficient education. Last week, before revisions, the budget was \$142 million.

Mr. Hrycenko spoke about the revenue realized because of the B.E.S.T. Program and its 355 students. The program runs from 6 AM to 6 PM, and will now offer a Kindergarten Wrap Around Program. Last year the District moved to a 4-tier Transportation system which caused a cost savings of over \$500,000. He thanked all of the parent groups for all that they do to enhance the students' programs. The District is continually looking for alternate revenue in grants. This year \$633,077.30 was brought into the District from grants.

Mr. Edwards outlined the savings which were created from the BMHS Solar Panels and announced that on April 20th the public would be asked to vote on three more solar panel projects with a conservative anticipated savings of \$222,300 a year.

Mr. Hrycenko explained the charts from the Comparative Spending Guide 2010 and how the District stands with regard to others of the same size. The total cost per pupil is below the State average, the Administrative salaries are the 3rd lowest in Ocean County and 8th lowest of 105 districts. 61.5% of the total budget is focused on classroom instruction. Brick Schools is the #2 District in Ocean County to ensure funds directly benefit classroom instruction. He invited the public to look at the Comparative Spending Guide and see that the District is fiscally responsible.

Mr. Edwards spoke about the tight budget timeline. He spoke about the \$17.4 million reduction of State Aid and the loss of surplus which would have gone for tax relief, giving a history of the State's funding formula with regard to Brick Township, and the Governor's plan to fix all budget problems in one year. He continued explaining the ramifications of funding for the next year also. He told the public that the budget presentation and budget breakdown will be on the website. He explained "Extraordinary Aid" for out-of-district students whose cost exceed \$55,000, and other intricacies of this budgeting process, such as restructuring the health plan offering, using a cap adjustment for Reduced State aid, not offering student accident insurance which is paid for by the Board, no field trips which are paid for by the Board, reduced staffing, reduced professional development, elimination of equipment requests, decreased supplies, no middle school sports, reduced high school and middle school activities/sports and reduced library/audio visual supplies.

Mr. Hrycenko outlined the anticipated staff reductions and then gave an estimate of class size.

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Mr. Edwards compared the spending in the budget to the consumer price index.

Mr. Woska recognized Councilmen DeLuca and Matthews.

Mr. Edwards continued, indicating that if the budget fails, and Town Council cuts one million dollars, cuts will be made as follows: 4 HS/MS teachers, Child Study Team Support, Sports & Extra Curricular Activities, Administrative Support and Social Worker. If the budget fails, and the Town Council cuts two million dollars, cuts will be made as follows: New Elementary Math Program, Social Worker, 3 Nurses, 10% Reduction in Supply Accounts, Librarian, 3 MS Teachers and equipment. He explained question #1 on the ballot – the Tax Levy \$95,613,938.00 and question #2 solar panel Referendum - (revenue positive). The website has a tax calculator which can be utilized to find out what impact the budget will have on an individual's taxes. He indicated that he has spoken with Senator Ciesla and Assemblymen Wolf and Holzapfel and they are willing to answer questions. He thanked Mr. Woska for the time to present the budget.

Mr. Woska thanked the Administration for a nice job, very clear picture of the financial restraints in place as the attempt is made to get a thorough and efficient education.
